
Let us know – we might be interested! We can't accept everything, keep in mind that condition and relevance are important factors, but our museum continues to grow because of donations from the community.

Museum of Me

We're still working on some details around this, but the intent of this project is to spark an interest in local history amongst younger people. The idea is to create an exhibit about prominent people in Arlington's history – for example, Tom Vandergriff or Carrie Rogers. The displays would be portable and small enough to fit in a box or suitcase and then presented to young students in history classes. It may prompt an interest in local history and inspire students to create a similar exhibit – a *Museum of Me* – for themselves.

Visit Fielder Museum

Former signage at our museum used to state, "Historic Fielder House: Home of the Arlington Historical Society." While that's correct, in hindsight, it may have been a bit misleading, especially for those unfamiliar with us. Arlington's population is constantly growing and changing. Many newcomers may have thought Fielder was simply an old home, a house museum, or just headquarters for the Arlington Historical Society. Even long-time residents may have forgotten about it over the years – if they even knew about it at all.



Lately, we've been making an effort to rebrand ourselves from Fielder House to **Fielder Museum**. (Of course, the official name is now Fielder Museum at Geraldine Mills Heritage Place!)

Fielder House to Fielder Museum a subtle difference, but it's to remind folks that the site, is in fact, a museum. Yes, it's a historic house and home to the Arlington Historical Society, but it's more than that. It's a museum about Arlington's history, filled with various exhibits – and it's open to the public. Stop by and we'll give you a guided tour, or feel free to wander and explore on your own.

What to expect:	Fielder Museum features more than a dozen exhibits (permanent and rotating) celebrating Arlington's history. Popular exhibits include our World War II room, a replica of Dr. Zack Bobo's office, personal items from actor Morgan Woodward, and artifacts from Arlington Downs racetrack. There's also a room with vintage toys and games popular with children (and adults!) who visit. The museum is in a house built in 1914; it has two stories and a basement, which is also popular. The building has an accessibility ramp for entry, although only stairs inside. Beautifully landscaped grounds also include a butterfly garden. The property has two Texas Historical Markers and other plaques on the grounds. There's air conditioning and heat for comfort, and restrooms are available.

Arlington Cemetery Receives New Signs, and Coming Soon, QR Codes

Arlington's Landmark Preservation Commission was recently involved with a project to make improvements at Arlington Cemetery. There are now street signs posted with the names of prominent citizens – William W. McNatt, Carrie Rogers, George Finger, W.C. Weeks, and W.H. Rose.

Coming soon, QR codes will be posted that you can scan with your smartphone to read about some of the citizens interred at the cemetery.

Thank you to the Landmark Preservation Commission for their continued work to preserve Arlington's history.

The exhibit runs through October 23.





Two Arlington Cemeteries Join National Wreaths Across America Day

The **Arlington Historical Society** is proud to be a corporate sponsor for the Lucretia Council Cochran Chapter of the DAR Wreaths Across America project.



National Wreaths Across America Day is December 17. First observed in 1992, this is a special and poignant event to honor Veterans. The non-profit organization's goal is to place a live balsam fir wreath, hand-tied with a red velvet bow, at the headstone of every Veteran. The organization's mission is to Remember, Honor, and Teach.

While more than 3,000 cemeteries participate across the U.S., two Arlington cemeteries will join the tribute this year: **Arlington Cemetery** and the adjacent **Parkdale Cemetery**.

There are over 850 Veterans interred in Arlington Cemetery and Parkdale Cemetery, representing U.S. military service participation from the 1840s through the Vietnam era.

If you'd like to sponsor wreaths, including one for a specific person, you can do so for \$15. Visit the Wreaths Across America website for more information, locate participating cemeteries, sponsor a wreath, or sign up to volunteer. Dallas-Fort Worth National Cemetery nearby in Dallas also participates in this event.

Happy 100th Birthday to Doland Maner!

Doland Maner turned 100 years old earlier this month! From the photos on Facebook, it looks like it was a great birthday party.

Mr. Maner served on the Arlington City Council from 1967 to 1975 and was instrumental in helping recruit the Washington Senators (now Texas Rangers) baseball club to Arlington. He has served the Arlington Historical Society and the Fielder Museum for many years.

Doland got to throw out the ceremonial first pitch at the Texas Rangers baseball game on August 7, which was his birthday. He gave a big smile as he tipped his cap to the Cheering crowd.
